

Applying Sun Tzu's Strategic Wisdom: Analyzing Pakistan Armed Forces' Strategy and Tactical Decisions in the May 2025 Indo-Pak Conflict

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Abstract

The May 2025 conflict between India and Pakistan marked a critical episode in South Asia's ongoing security dilemma, characterized by swift military actions, intense information warfare, and high-stakes diplomacy. This research paper analyzes the strategic conduct of the Pakistan Armed Forces during this confrontation, using Sun Tzu's classical military treatise *The Art of War* as an analytical framework. Drawing on core principles such as the value of deception, the advantage of knowing both self and enemy, the importance of terrain, the merit of calculated restraint, and the art of winning without fighting, this study examines how Pakistan's military decisions reflected—or diverged from—ancient strategic wisdom. Particular focus is given to Pakistan's rapid mobilization, cross-domain deterrence, information control, and diplomatic maneuvering in response to Indian military posturing. The analysis reveals that several of Pakistan's moves, including its calibrated responses and strategic signaling, exhibit a conscious or unconscious alignment with Sun Tzu's philosophies. The study concludes that the Pakistan Armed Forces' approach during the May 2025 conflict represents a modern adaptation of classical strategic thought, aimed at achieving deterrence, avoiding escalation, and maintaining strategic equilibrium in a nuclear-armed region.

Introduction:

The geopolitical rivalry between India and Pakistan, rooted in a complex history of territorial disputes, ideological divergence, and national identity, has produced several flashpoints since their partition in 1947. Among these, the May 2025 conflict stands out as a critical juncture in the evolving military dynamics of South Asia. While the skirmish did not escalate into full-scale war, it showcased the increasing sophistication of both countries' military doctrines, particularly

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Pakistan's strategic calculus under high-pressure conditions. In this context, the theoretical frameworks offered by Sun Tzu's *The Art of War*—a timeless treatise on strategy, warfare, and statecraft—provide a compelling lens through which to assess Pakistan's military posture and operational decisions.

Sun Tzu emphasizes the importance of intelligence, deception, psychological dominance, and strategic flexibility—concepts that remain strikingly relevant in the nuclearized South Asian context. His principles advocate for achieving victory without prolonged conflict, winning without fighting, and using indirect methods to outmaneuver the enemy. This study investigates the extent to which the Pakistan Armed Forces applied these principles in their response to Indian military movements during the May 2025 border escalation. Through an examination of key military actions, communication strategies, and diplomatic signaling, this paper argues that Pakistan's approach reflects a nuanced and modern adaptation of Sun Tzu's strategic insights.

By bridging classical military philosophy and contemporary strategic behavior, this research not only enriches the theoretical understanding of Pakistan's defense doctrine but also contributes to a broader discussion on the applicability of ancient wisdom in modern asymmetric conflicts. Ultimately, it seeks to assess whether the events of May 2025 signify a deliberate embodiment of Sun Tzu's ideas or a convergence of strategic traditions shaped by South Asia's unique security environment.

Pakistan's Military Doctrine and Strategic Evolution:

The strategic behavior of the Pakistan Armed Forces during the May 2025 conflict with India can be critically analyzed through the lens of Sun Tzu's *The Art of War*. This section reviews existing literature on Pakistan's military doctrine, the applicability of Sun Tzu's principles in modern warfare, and the specific events of the May 2025 conflict.

Pakistan's military strategy has historically been influenced by the doctrine of "Bleed India with a Thousand Cuts," which emphasizes asymmetric warfare and the use of non-state actors to destabilize India (Gates & Roy, 2016). This approach aligns with Sun Tzu's advocacy for indirect methods of warfare. Pathania (2019) discusses the evolution of Pakistan's military doctrine, highlighting a shift towards hybrid warfare that combines conventional and unconventional tactics to achieve strategic objectives.

Sun Tzu's *The Art of War* remains relevant in contemporary military strategy. Shamsi (2023) explores the application of Sun Tzu's principles in hybrid warfare, emphasizing the importance of psychological operations, deception, and strategic flexibility. Sahgal (n.d.) notes that Pakistan's adoption of prolonged low-intensity conflicts reflects Sun Tzu's teachings on exhausting the enemy through sustained pressure rather than confrontation.

The May 2025 Indo-Pak Conflict:

The May 2025 conflict between India and Pakistan was marked by rapid escalation and subsequent de-escalation. India launched Operation Sindoor in response to a terrorist attack, targeting alleged militant infrastructure in Pakistan. Pakistan retaliated with missile strikes and claimed the downing of Indian aircraft (Financial Times, 2025). The conflict concluded with a U.S.-brokered ceasefire, which Pakistan viewed as a diplomatic success despite military setbacks (Reuters, 2025).

Analysts observed that Pakistan's restrained response and emphasis on diplomatic channels were consistent with Sun Tzu's principle of achieving objectives without prolonged warfare. The conflict highlighted Pakistan's strategic use of psychological operations and information warfare to manage both domestic and international perceptions.

Integration of Sun Tzu's Principles in Pakistan's Strategy:

The circumstantial analysis suggests that Pakistan's military strategy during the May 2025 conflict incorporated several of Sun Tzu's principles:

- i. **Deception and Surprise:** Utilizing unexpected tactics to catch the adversary off guard.
- ii. **Psychological Warfare:** Managing perceptions to undermine the enemy's morale.
- iii. **Strategic Flexibility:** Adapting to changing circumstances to maintain strategic advantage.
- iv. **Avoidance of Prolonged Conflict:** Seeking swift resolution to prevent resource depletion.

These elements underscore the enduring relevance of Sun Tzu's teachings in modern military conflicts and their influence on Pakistan's strategic decisions. This study employs a qualitative research methodology grounded in thematic analysis to examine the strategic behavior of the Pakistan Armed Forces during the May 2025 conflict with India, through the interpretive lens of Sun Tzu's *The Art of War*. The methodology is structured around three core components: data collection, analytical framework, and thematic interpretation.

Here are some neutral media reports detailing significant losses and challenges faced by India during the May 2025 Indo-Pak conflict, which support the analysis of Pakistan's strategic success:

- i. **Loss of Fighter Jets:** According to Reuters, Pakistan claimed to have shot down five Indian aircraft, including three Rafale jets, a MiG-29, and a Su-30MKI. The Washington Post reported that three Indian fighter jets, including two Rafales and a Mirage 2000, crashed in India on May 7, with their pilots hospitalized. These incidents highlight vulnerabilities in India's air operations and suggest that Pakistan's air defense capabilities were effective during the conflict (Wikipedia contributors, 2025). The verification of India's fighter jet losses during the May 2025 Indo-Pak conflict was substantiated through multiple independent and credible sources, including satellite imagery, eyewitness accounts, and official statements. The Washington Post conducted a detailed analysis of satellite imagery and photographs from crash sites in Indian-administered Kashmir. Their investigation identified debris consistent with at least two French-made fighter jets, including a Dassault Rafale and a Mirage 2000, which had crashed during the conflict. The visual evidence corroborated reports of aircraft losses. (The Washington Post, 2025). Reuters reported that local government sources in Indian-administered Kashmir confirmed that three fighter jets had crashed on May 7, 2025. These sources provided firsthand accounts of the incidents, lending credibility to the claims of aircraft losses. The Indian Air Force acknowledged the occurrence of

aircraft losses, stating that “losses are a part of combat” in a public statement. While they did not provide specific details, this admission indicated that the losses were recognized at the official level (Reuters Staff, 2025). U.S. officials reported that a Chinese-made Pakistani J-10 fighter jet had successfully shot down at least two Indian military aircraft, including a Rafale, during the conflict. This assessment was based on intelligence gathered during the aerial engagements and provided an external confirmation of the aircraft losses (Shah & Ali, 2025).

- ii. **Civilian Casualties and Infrastructure Damage:** The conflict resulted in significant civilian casualties in India. Reuters reported that at least 21 civilians and five military personnel were killed, with the majority of casualties occurring in Poonch district, where a gurudwara,² a school, and houses were damaged. Additionally, a Catholic school in Indian-administered Kashmir was hit by Pakistani shelling, resulting in the deaths of two students (Wikipedia contributors, 2025). The verification of civilian casualties and infrastructure damage during the May 2025 Indo-Pakistani conflict was substantiated through multiple independent and credible sources, including satellite imagery, eyewitness accounts, and official statements. A Washington Post visual analysis identified debris consistent with French-made fighter jets—a Dassault Rafale and a Mirage 2000—in crash sites in Indian-administered Kashmir, corroborating reports of aircraft losses during the conflict (Piper et al., 2025; Clary, 2025). Reuters reported that three fighter jets had crashed in Jammu and Kashmir on May 7, 2025, based on statements from local government sources, providing firsthand accounts of the incidents (Reuters, 2025d). The Indian Air Force acknowledged that “losses are a part of combat” in an official statement, a tacit admission of aircraft losses at the official level. U.S. officials reported that a Chinese-made Pakistani J-10 fighter jet had successfully shot down at least two Indian military aircraft, including a Rafale, based on intelligence assessments of the aerial engagements (Reuters Staff, 2025). Collectively, these sources offer a comprehensive and corroborated account of Indian fighter-jet losses during the May 2025 conflict, supporting an analysis of the strategic dynamics between India and Pakistan during this period.
- iii. **Disruptions to Civil Aviation:** The escalation led to significant disruptions in air travel. India closed 27 airports in its northern and western regions, resulting in the cancellation of over 430 flights. Major Indian airlines, including Air India, IndiGo, and SpiceJet, suspended operations to and from affected areas. International carriers such as Lufthansa, KLM, Singapore Airlines, and Thai Airways rerouted flights to avoid Pakistani airspace, leading to longer travel times and delays (IANS, 2025). The verification of air traffic disruptions during the May 2025 Indo-Pak conflict is substantiated through multiple credible sources, including official statements, media reports, and flight tracking data. The Airports Authority of India (AAI) issued Notices to Airmen (NOTAMs) that led to the closure of 27 airports in northern and western regions of India until May 10, 2025. This action was taken due to security concerns arising from the escalating tensions with Pakistan. The Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) of Pakistan announced restrictions on Karachi and Lahore airspace, specifying closures from 4:00 AM to 8:00 AM local time daily

between May 1 and May 31, 2025. These measures were implemented to mitigate security risks during the heightened tensions (PTI, 2025). Major Indian airlines, including Air India and IndiGo, canceled numerous flights to and from affected regions. For instance, on May 13, 2025, both airlines suspended operations to several cities such as Amritsar, Leh, Jammu, and Chandigarh due to ongoing security concerns (ET Online, 2025). Shaheed Bhagat Singh International Airport in Chandigarh resumed operations on May 12, 2025, after a temporary suspension due to regional tensions. The resumption followed the withdrawal of NOTAMs by the Airports Authority of India (Saluja, 2025). Flight tracking platforms such as FlightRadar24 reported significant reductions in air traffic over the affected regions during the conflict. The data indicated a sharp decline in flights operating in and out of northern and western India, corroborating reports of widespread flight cancellations and rerouting. Collectively, these sources provide a comprehensive and corroborated account of the air traffic disruptions during the May 2025 Indo-Pak conflict, highlighting the significant impact on regional and international aviation.

- iv. **Economic Impact:** The conflict had a detrimental effect on India's economy. Stock markets in both India and Pakistan experienced significant volatility during the week of the conflict. The Indian economy, already fragile, faced additional strain due to the escalating tensions and the associated costs of military operations. The economic impact of the May 2025 India–Pakistan conflict has been verified through various credible sources, including government reports, media coverage, and financial data. Reuters reported that the Indian rupee experienced significant volatility during the conflict. On May 13, 2025, the rupee strengthened to 84.6350 against the U.S. dollar, driven by the ceasefire between India and Pakistan. However, gains were offset by declines in Indian stock indices, such as the Nifty 50 and BSE Sensex, which fell approximately 1.5% due to concerns over shifting foreign investments (Karla, 2025). The suspension of the Indus Waters Treaty by India on April 23, 2025, led to significant trade disruptions. India halted the flow of water on the Chenab River from the Baglihar Dam, a move that Pakistan considered a serious violation of the treaty. Additionally, maritime trade between India and Pakistan was suspended, impacting bilateral trade valued at around \$10 billion (The Maritime Executive, 2025; Shankar & Sharma, 2025).³ In Mizoram, India, the sealing of the India-Bangladesh border amid the conflict severely disrupted ginger exports to Bangladesh, leading to a sharp decline in prices and economic strain on local farmers (India, 2025). The construction of the HPCL Rajasthan Refinery Ltd (HRRL) project in Pachpadra faced significant delays due to ongoing drone and missile threats from Pakistan. Safety concerns led to the suspension of night shifts and power outages, affecting over 2,000 workers and hindering progress on the Rs 70,000 crore project (TNN, 2025). These verified reports illustrate the multifaceted economic impact of the conflict, affecting currency stability, trade relations, agriculture, and infrastructure development.

Data Collection:

The research utilizes **secondary data** drawn from the following sources:

- **Official statements and press briefings** by Pakistan’s Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR) and India’s Ministry of Defence.
- **Reports and articles** from credible international and regional media outlets such as *Reuters*, *Financial Times*, *Al Jazeera*, *BBC*, and *The Hindu*.
- **Academic publications** and think tank analyses from institutions like the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS), the Institute of Strategic Studies Islamabad (ISSI), and Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.
- **Translations and interpretations of Sun Tzu’s *The Art of War*** (Griffith, 1963; Shamsi, 2023).
- **Military doctrine papers and strategic commentaries** related to Pakistan’s defense posture.

All sources were selected based on credibility, relevance to the topic, and timeliness concerning the May 2025 events.

Analytical Framework:

The analytical framework is built upon key strategic principles derived from *The Art of War* by Sun Tzu. Five core themes serve as the interpretive lens:

1. **Deception as Strategy** – “All warfare is based on deception.”
2. **Knowledge of Self and Enemy** – “If you know the enemy and know yourself, you need not fear the result of a hundred battles.”
3. **Speed and Adaptability** – “Speed is the essence of war.”
4. **Avoidance of Prolonged Conflict** – “There is no instance of a country having benefited from prolonged warfare.”
5. **Psychological and Moral Influence** – “To subdue the enemy without fighting is the acme of skill.”

These themes are used as codes in the thematic analysis of Pakistan’s military and diplomatic responses during the May 2025 conflict.

Thematic Analysis Procedure:

A three-stage process was followed:

- **Identification of Key Events:** Major developments during the May 2025 conflict were identified, including border incidents, airspace violations, and strategic communications.
- **Coding and Mapping:** These events were analyzed and coded according to the five Sun Tzu-based strategic themes.
- **Interpretation:** Patterns were interpreted to assess whether and how Pakistan’s strategy aligned with Sun Tzu’s principles.

The analysis is interpretive, not causal, and aims to provide insights rather than definitive judgments about military intentions or classified decision-making.

Limitations:

This study is limited by the reliance on open-source data and media reporting, which may not fully capture behind-the-scenes military deliberations. Furthermore, interpreting modern military action through an ancient philosophical lens inherently involves a degree of abstraction and subjectivity.

Analytical findings:

This section analyzes the strategic behavior of the Pakistan Armed Forces during the May 2025 conflict with India, based on five core principles from Sun Tzu's *The Art of War*. Each theme is applied to real events to examine whether Pakistan's actions reflect classical strategic thinking.

Deception as Strategy: “All warfare is based on deception.” — Sun Tzu: Pakistan's initial military and diplomatic stance during the early days of the May 2025 crisis reflected a posture of ambiguity. While India claimed to have targeted militant hideouts across the Line of Control (LoC), Pakistan's response was measured yet subtly forceful. The Pakistan Air Force (PAF) conducted low-visibility air patrols and repositioned forward-deployed aircraft under the guise of routine training exercises (Reuters, 2025). Moreover, Pakistan's ISPR delayed releasing operational footage of its retaliatory strike, allowing confusion to spread in Indian media about whether Pakistan had responded at all. This mirrors Sun Tzu's concept of using strategic opacity to confuse and disorient the adversary. The delayed but impactful communication campaign ensured Pakistan controlled the narrative on both domestic and international fronts.

Knowledge of Self and Enemy: “If you know the enemy and know yourself, you need not fear the result of a hundred battles.” — Sun Tzu: The Pakistan Armed Forces demonstrated a clear understanding of Indian military capabilities and political constraints. Anticipating a strong Indian media and public response after the Srinagar attack, Pakistan pre-emptively reached out to China, Turkey, and Saudi Arabia to gain diplomatic support and regional leverage. Internally, Pakistan's National Security Committee emphasized civilian-military coordination, revealing a sound appraisal of its own institutional strengths and public sentiment. The containment of escalation can be seen as a result of accurately reading India's domestic pressures in an election year and the risks of full-scale war in a nuclearized environment (Pathania, 2019).

Speed and Adaptability: “Speed is the essence of war.” — Sun Tzu: Following India's air incursions, Pakistan swiftly mobilized its air defense and forward operating bases within 24 hours. The PAF reportedly placed interceptors on standby, while naval units were discreetly repositioned in the Arabian Sea (Financial Times, 2025). Such agility ensured that Pakistan retained operational readiness while avoiding overt provocation. The quick but restrained response aligns with Sun Tzu's emphasis on exploiting time and opportunity without being drawn into attritional warfare. This also enabled Pakistan to maintain escalation dominance without crossing critical red lines.

Avoidance of Prolonged Conflict: “There is no instance of a country having benefited from prolonged warfare.” — Sun Tzu: Despite strong internal pressure for retaliation, Pakistan chose limited, controlled military action. This included a symbolic retaliatory missile strike on non-civilian infrastructure, followed by a media statement emphasizing Pakistan’s “right to respond” but not its intent to escalate further. This calculated restraint reflects an understanding of the costs and unpredictability of prolonged conflict, especially in the shadow of nuclear deterrence. By opting for swift action followed by diplomatic engagement, Pakistan adhered closely to Sun Tzu’s philosophy of achieving strategic goals while minimizing direct confrontation and duration of conflict.

Psychological and Moral Influence: “To subdue the enemy without fighting is the acme of skill.” — Sun Tzu: The ISPR’s strategic communication played a crucial role in shaping public perception and morale. By portraying Pakistan’s response as dignified yet firm, the military maintained public confidence and created psychological pressure on India. Social media campaigns, interviews with military officials, and selective release of aerial footage were used to highlight Pakistan’s readiness and moral high ground. This psychological messaging was not only aimed at the domestic population but also at the international community, where Pakistan sought to frame the conflict as an act of Indian aggression. Such narrative control is consistent with Sun Tzu’s teaching that moral strength and perception management can serve as force multipliers.

Discussion:

The analysis shows that Pakistan’s military and strategic posture during the May 2025 conflict closely aligns with several of Sun Tzu’s core teachings. Through deception, speed, psychological warfare, and calibrated restraint, Pakistan demonstrated an evolved strategic outlook designed to achieve deterrence without descending into full-scale war. These choices underscore a conscious or instinctive adaptation of ancient principles to modern geopolitical realities.

The May 2025 conflict between India and Pakistan serves as a revealing case study of how ancient strategic principles, particularly those found in Sun Tzu’s *The Art of War*, continue to resonate in modern geopolitical and military arenas. The findings suggest that Pakistan’s conduct during the crisis—characterized by calculated restraint, information control, and diplomatic maneuvering—mirrored several of Sun Tzu’s central tenets. This section discusses the broader implications of these findings in terms of strategic culture, military doctrine, regional stability, and the utility of classical theory in contemporary warfare.

- i **Pakistan’s Strategic Culture and Adaptation:** Pakistan’s military response in May 2025 indicates a maturation of its strategic culture. Traditionally accused of reactive posturing and tactical adventurism (Gates & Roy, 2016), Pakistan now appears to be adopting a more deliberate and calculated approach to conflict management. The application of Sun Tzu’s principles—especially those concerning deception, psychological influence, and minimal escalation—illustrates a shift toward strategic asymmetry that avoids direct kinetic confrontation while preserving deterrence. Rather than relying solely on conventional force projection, Pakistan strategically used limited retaliation and narrative framing to accomplish its immediate objectives: demonstrating resolve, avoiding war, and gaining

diplomatic leverage. This aligns closely with Sun Tzu's maxim that "the supreme art of war is to subdue the enemy without fighting."

- ii **Hybrid Warfare and Information Dominance:** The use of hybrid warfare, which combines military, informational, and psychological tools, was clearly evident in Pakistan's approach. The country's ability to influence international opinion through timely diplomatic engagement and media management reflects a deeper understanding of what Sun Tzu calls "shaping the battlefield." The ISPR's measured information release and its timing highlight the deliberate crafting of narratives, an essential component of modern hybrid conflicts (Shamsi, 2023). The blurred lines between truth and propaganda in the information space, especially during a high-tension event like May 2025, show that non-kinetic tools of war can now yield disproportionate strategic returns—an area where Pakistan arguably outmaneuvered India during this conflict.
- iii **Regional Stability and Strategic Signaling:** By avoiding a prolonged or full-scale confrontation, Pakistan helped prevent escalation into a potentially catastrophic war. Sun Tzu's emphasis on the costs of prolonged conflict resonates strongly in the South Asian context, where both nuclear-armed states face the threat of strategic miscalculation. The limited and symbolic nature of Pakistan's military retaliation served a dual purpose: satisfying domestic demands for response and sending a calibrated message to India. This act of strategic signaling is crucial in a volatile region where misinterpretation of intent can spiral quickly. In this sense, Pakistan's approach may contribute to a long-term doctrinal shift toward deterrence-by-denial, rather than deterrence-by-punishment.
- iv **Sun Tzu as an Analytical Lens:** The effectiveness of using *The Art of War* to analyze Pakistan's strategy during the May 2025 conflict demonstrates the enduring relevance of classical military philosophy. While some critics argue that such texts are too abstract for modern application, this case shows otherwise. Sun Tzu's concepts offer a flexible, principle-based framework that can interpret contemporary state behavior, especially where formal doctrine is opaque or evolving. By viewing Pakistan's response through this lens, we gain insights not only into what Pakistan did, but why it may have chosen those actions, shedding light on an implicit strategic logic grounded in centuries-old wisdom.

Conclusion:

The May 2025 Indo-Pak conflict serves as a modern manifestation of the complex and evolving dynamics of warfare in a nuclearized South Asian context. Through the lens of Sun Tzu's *The Art of War*, this paper has analyzed Pakistan's military strategy and tactical decisions, revealing a sophisticated application of classical principles in contemporary warfare. Pakistan's restrained but assertive response, strategic use of information warfare, and avoidance of full-scale escalation reflect an intentional alignment with Sun Tzu's concepts of deception, speed, psychological influence, and the importance of avoiding prolonged conflict.

The findings suggest that Pakistan's evolving military doctrine is moving towards a more **strategic, hybrid approach**, where psychological and diplomatic tools are integrated with military force to shape outcomes without direct confrontation. This shift highlights a broader trend in modern conflicts where **non-kinetic tools**, including information dominance, diplomatic

signaling, and psychological warfare, can significantly influence the trajectory of military engagements. Pakistan's actions during the conflict further reinforce the idea that Sun Tzu's teachings are not only relevant but also highly adaptable to the complexities of modern warfare.

Ultimately, the May 2025 conflict illustrates that in the nuclear age, military responses must be measured, deliberate, and often indirect, with emphasis on achieving objectives without pushing the adversary into a corner. The continued application of **classical strategic principles** will likely remain an invaluable asset for military leaders and policymakers in South Asia, where the specter of nuclear war demands careful management of both escalation and de-escalation.

While the events of May 2025 have concluded with relative peace, they serve as a reminder of the delicate balance that exists in the region. Further research could explore how these principles manifest in other regions experiencing similar geopolitical tensions, as well as how emerging technologies—such as cyber warfare and artificial intelligence—may alter the strategic paradigms derived from Sun Tzu's *The Art of War*.

Recommendations:

1. **Embrace and Expand Hybrid Warfare Capabilities:** During the May 2025 conflict, Pakistan's use of information warfare and psychological operations played a key role in shaping international narratives and domestic morale. The strategic ambiguity and limited military responses were instrumental in avoiding escalation while asserting Pakistan's stance. Pakistan should prioritize cyber warfare both offensively and defensively. The development of cyber units capable of targeting critical infrastructure and military systems in adversary states could provide Pakistan with an additional layer of deterrence and attack capability. Using cyber operations alongside conventional responses (such as limited missile strikes) would enhance deterrence without escalating conflict to full-scale war. Building on the 2025 conflict's information strategy, Pakistan could further professionalize and expand its information warfare capabilities. Pakistan should focus on targeting adversary morale and influencing international perceptions through social media, international press outlets, and covert media channels to undermine public support for conflict while bolstering its own narrative.
2. **Strengthen Deterrence and Resilience in the Nuclear Domain:** In the May 2025 conflict, Pakistan's nuclear deterrent played a critical role in deterring full-scale warfare, with both Pakistan and India being careful of crossing the threshold for nuclear escalation. The restrained use of force, along with messaging surrounding the nuclear balance, prevented major escalation. Pakistan should modernize and diversify its nuclear forces, emphasizing low-yield nuclear weapons and second-strike capabilities. This would ensure that any escalation towards a nuclear exchange remains highly unpredictable, allowing Pakistan to control the nuclear escalation ladder. Pakistan should push for bilateral nuclear confidence-building measures (CBMs) with India, including nuclear hotlines, crisis communication frameworks, and shared risk-reduction measures. These could help manage the risk of miscalculation in moments of high tension.
3. **Refine Strategic Response Doctrine and Avoid Prolonged Warfare:** Pakistan's military strategy during the May 2025 conflict reflected Sun Tzu's principle that "there is no instance of a country having benefited from prolonged warfare."

Pakistan's rapid and limited retaliation after India's initial strikes was an effective means of responding without allowing the conflict to drag on, thus reducing the risk of escalation. Pakistan should continue its emphasis on restrained responses to provocations. By using quick, decisive, and symbolic strikes, Pakistan could achieve its strategic goals without engaging in prolonged conflict. The use of proxy forces, special operations, and covert action should be explored as alternatives to direct engagement, in line with Sun Tzu's principle of indirect warfare. Future military responses should emphasize flexibility and speed, with Pakistan's armed forces being able to rapidly assess and adjust tactics based on real-time intelligence. This would allow Pakistan to act decisively in fast-evolving situations, maintaining the strategic initiative without pushing the conflict to larger, uncontrollable levels.

4. **Pursue Greater Regional Diplomacy and Military Alliances:** Throughout the May 2025 conflict, Pakistan's diplomatic efforts, particularly with countries like China, Turkey, and Saudi Arabia, were key in gaining international support and counteracting Indian narratives. By emphasizing restraint and presenting itself as a peace-oriented state, Pakistan secured strategic diplomatic positioning on the global stage. Pakistan should continue to fortify its relations with China, leveraging the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) and mutual security concerns. Additionally, building military-to-military ties with countries like Turkey and Saudi Arabia can serve to strengthen Pakistan's position in case of future conflicts. Pakistan should lead in creating a platform for dialogue with its regional neighbors, including India. Establishing bilateral confidence-building mechanisms, trade agreements, and cultural exchanges can reduce the chances of accidental escalation. Pakistan's role as a potential regional mediator could also enhance its international standing.
5. **Advance Modernization of Conventional Forces and Technological Innovation:** The May 2025 conflict showed that Pakistan's military modernization efforts—especially in air defense systems and surveillance—were critical in managing the conflict and maintaining strategic deterrence. However, Pakistan's ability to deter through conventional force could be further bolstered. Pakistan should invest in cutting-edge air defense systems, such as S-400 or indigenous air defense technologies, to safeguard critical infrastructure and prevent adversary air strikes from gaining tactical advantage. The Pakistan Navy should prioritize submarine warfare and surface ship modernization, as well as anti-ship missile systems to project power in the region, especially in the Arabian Sea and Indian Ocean, where maritime security is crucial to Pakistan's strategic interests. The incorporation of AI, unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs), and robotic technologies could provide Pakistan with a technological edge in surveillance, reconnaissance, and even offensive capabilities, giving it the ability to conduct operations with greater precision and fewer casualties.
6. **Focus on Internal Security and Counter-Insurgency Operations:** Internal security threats, such as those posed by militant groups in the region, continue to plague Pakistan's strategic environment. While military responses to external threats are vital, Pakistan's internal security needs to be as robust as its external defense. Pakistan should continue to refine its counter-terrorism capabilities, focusing on intelligence-driven counterinsurgency operations. A more aggressive

stance against militant sanctuaries on both sides of the border could prevent external actors from gaining footholds in the region. Enhancing Pakistan's intelligence gathering and counter-radicalization efforts will help to thwart internal threats and allow the armed forces to remain focused on external defense. Greater coordination between military and civilian intelligence agencies is essential for countering asymmetric threats from non-state actors.

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
